




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Publisher's Note



I am absolutely delighted that the first publisher's note I write is for Dundurn Press's Fall 2024 catalogue. We have some mighty powerful fiction here. The Rise and Fall of Magic Wolf by Giller—, Writers' Trust—, and Canada Reads—nominated author Timothy Taylor details the highs and lows of the restaurant industry when accusations of cultural appropriation and sexual abuse cast their long shadow. Clarissa Trinidad Gonzalez's debut novel, Celestina's House, takes readers on a journey into the atmospheric, magical, and mesmerizing world of a young woman who inherits a house in the Philippines. If you missed them last time, we are publishing the next books in two bestselling series: our 101 Fascinating Facts series returns with 101 Fascinating Canadian Film and TV Facts by Thom Ernst, host of the acclaimed Saturday Night at the Movies; and Mike Commito's exceptional Hockey 365 series continues with Habs 365 — a perfect companion... or competitor — to Leafs 365. Watch for more forthcoming titles from both series in the new year as well.

The House of Spirits meets Mexican Gothic in a gothic tale of love and heartbreak, spirits and malice, freedom and bonds, and the supernatural spirits that pervade life in the Philippines.

The secrets of the house are the secrets of the heart.

It begins with an act of betrayal that destroys the tenuous bonds of Celestina Errantes's family. For years after, Celestina longs for an escape from her unhappy home. Then an unexpected gift from her wealthy Lolo offers that chance: a long-forsaken property in Manila's bohemian district, close to where ladies of the evening ply their trade. It is no place for a proper young woman, but this house, even with its ghosts, makes Celestina feel at home.

Celestina tears into life as a wild child and loses herself in the pleasures of the night. Many bittersweet experiences later, she captivates an aristocratic restaurateur, who holds the promise to a fresh start together, in a home without ghosts.

Then a sinister voice from the past threatens to drive the storybook lovers apart forever.

Clarissa Trinidad Gonzalez was born in the Philippines, rather aptly on Hallowe'en, and grew up in a world animated by spirits and even the occasional miracle. *Celestina's House* is her debut novel. Clarissa lives in Toronto.



In the seventh book in the award-winning Inspector Green series, an old man is found beaten to death on a street corner in Ottawa's Byward Market in what initially appears to be a mugging gone wrong. The victim is identified as Dr. Samuel Rosenthal, a retired psychiatrist with a contentious approach to life and treatment. When Green discovers that the doctor recently changed his will, disinheriting his estranged son and benefiting several former patients whom he believed he had failed, the mystery only deepens.

But who is the young mystery woman seen visiting Rosenthal every Saturday night? And more importantly, what does she know about the doctor's death? Green races to track down the young visitor, but he is unprepared for the final resolution that leaves him grappling with the ultimate meaning of justice.

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

A child of Holocaust survivors grapples with his parents' untold stories and their profound effect on the course of his extraordinary life.

Growing up in Toronto, Sam Chaiton and his brothers knew their parents had been prisoners in Bergen-Belsen. But what their parents wouldn't share about their history — including the fact they had also been in Auschwitz — ended up shaping their children's lives.

We Used to Dream of Freedom touches on the biggest concerns of our time: what a family is or could be, about the psychology of survivors and the impact of survivor silence, about the responsibility of second generations from traumatized communities to share knowledge drawn from their own histories to help alleviate the suffering of others. Irreverent, moving, and tragic, often all at once, at its heart is a story of a man who disappeared on his family, his quest to understand why he had to leave, and the long-overdue discovery about his parents that brought him back.

Sam Chaiton, the middle son of Holocaust survivors, is one of the Canadians who helped Rubin Carter gain his freedom. Co-author of the international bestseller *Lazarus and the Hurricane*, he is portrayed in the film *The Hurricane* by Liev Schreiber. A founder of Innocence Canada, Sam lives with his partner in Toronto.



The best-known songs in the world are violent, sexist, and religious — so why do we celebrate national anthems when we should be rewriting them?

This fascinating popular history of national anthems begins in a London theatre in 1745 when the modern idea of anthems was born. They started out as triumphant expressions of national superiority by glorifying violence, claiming the support of God, and mostly ignoring women.

David Pate has experienced the violent side of anthems firsthand: as a schoolboy in Scotland, he was caned for refusing to sing "God Save the Queen." He says it's time to dump lyrics about cutting throats, watering fields with blood, building walls with the bodies of enemies, and celebrating the sound of machine guns.

The Worst Songs in the World looks at the origins of many of the world's anthems, from the movie theme song that became China's national anthem to the English tune used for "The Star-Spangled Banner."

This wide-ranging and deeply researched history combines politics, personalities, humour, and vivid storytelling to argue for better national songs.

David Pate was a veteran journalist who stood to attention for dozens of national anthems and thought most of them are terrible songs. Born in Scotland, he worked for numerous media outlets, including Ireland's public radio and the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.



He has been seen on such history programs as APTN's *Nations at War* and National Geographic's *Hitler's Last Stand*, and is the host of the popular history podcast *Curious Canadian History*. He lives in Vancouver.

When the North American dream meets traditional Japanese conformity, two cultures collide.

Does the past define who we are, who we become?

In April 1942, Suzanne's mother was an eight-month-old baby when her family was torn from their home in Victoria, B.C. Arriving at Vancouver's Hastings Park, her family bunked in horse stalls for months before being removed to an incarceration camp in the Slocan Valley. After the Second World War, forced resettlement scattered Japanese families across Canada leading to high intermarriage rates and an erosion of ethnicity. Loss of heritage language impeded the sharing of stories, contributing to strained generational relationships and a conflict between eastern and western values.

This hybrid memoir and fourth-generation narrative of the Japanese Canadian experience bridges the individual and collective to celebrate family, places, and traditions. Steeped in history and cultural arts, it shows us how a community triumphed over adversity to rebuild their lives and make lasting contributions to the Toronto landscape.

Suzanne Elki Yoko Hartmann is an editor and the author of a children's book, *My Father's Nose*. Her work reflects her roots as a fourth-generation Japanese Canadian with German ancestry, and explores cultural memories, meaningful coincidences, community, and identity. She lives in Toronto.







The political life of Dene leader Georges Erasmus — a radical Native rights crusader widely regarded as one of the most important Indigenous leaders of the past fifty years.

For decades, Georges Henry Erasmus led the fight for Indigenous rights. From the Berger Inquiry to the Canadian constitutional talks to the Oka Crisis, Georges was a significant figure in Canada's political landscape. In the 1990s, he led the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples and afterward was chair and president of the Aboriginal Healing Foundation, around the time that Canada's residential school system became an ongoing front-page story.

Georges's five decade battle for Indigenous rights took him around the world and saw him sitting across the table from prime ministers and premiers. In the 1980s, when Georges was the National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations, he was referred to as the Thirteenth Premier. This book tells the personal story of his life as a leading Indigenous figure, taking the reader inside some of Canada's biggest crises and challenges.

Wayne K. Spear was born in Buffalo, New York, and grew up in Fort Erie, Ontario. A Kanien'kehá:ka (Mohawk), he has worked for more than two decades in health and education. His previous books include *Residential Schools, with the Words and Images of Survivors* and *Full Circle: The Aboriginal Healing Foundation and the Unfinished Work of Hope, Healing, and Reconciliation.* He lives in Toronto.

Georges Erasmus was born in Fort Rae, Northwest Territories. He is a former president of the Indian Brotherhood of Northwest Territories (later the Dene Nation), National Chief of the Assembly of First Nations, and chair of the Aboriginal Healing Foundation. Georges was co-chair of the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples. He has received the Aboriginal Achievement Award for Public Service and he is an Officer of the Order of Canada. He lives in Yellowknife.
